# CITY TO FORM NEW CRESIDENTIAL TIF DISTRICT



A priority of the City of Harvey is to improve the condition of community's housing stock. Many homes were vacated or given up due to economic stress dating back to the 2008 recession. The City realizes these vacant properties need immediate attention.

The City is setting up a program to provide over the next 20+ years a way for new housing and rehab housing to be financed and constructed. It is called the Transit-Oriented District (TOD) TIF (tax increment financing). This new program will help the residential area in central and downtown Harvey, as well as area businesses. The boundaries will run from the UChicago Medicine Ingalls Memorial campus connecting to downtown Harvey (see the map pictured right).

Also, the City has joined the South Suburban Land Bank Development Authority to help put vacant homes back on the market. The Land Bank often temporarily acquires the vacant homes and take care of maintenance, while finding future buyers.

Additionally, the City continues to pursue demolition of the most hazardous buildings. The City has used its resources and grant funds to take down dangerous, vacant buildings.



### **City Working on Wifi for All**

Are you in need of WiFi? Wouldn't you like to be able to connect to the Internet from home, school, library, park, anywhere? Residents might actually enjoy the convenience of a citywide wireless network soon.

The City of Harvey is working with national experts, such as the Benton Institute, and the Illinois Department of Commerce and Economic Opportunity (IDCEO) to create a plan that will close the digital divide by making WiFi available throughout the entire city

What exactly does this mean for residents of the City of Harvey? It means that citywide WiFi will help students who are participating in school from home. It will help UChicago Medicine Ingalls Memorial patients seeking telemedicine (have a doctor's visit online). Ultimately, it will help residents who don't have access to fast-speed Internet.

The project is in its early stage of development. The City of Harvey hopes to offer community-wide wireless network some time in 2021.

# TEW TECHNOLOGY An Early Intervention Plan



The City of Harvey Police Department is using new software to improve their service. The program is provided by Benchmark Analytics, an evidence-based analytics firm. The department will use this new software to capture information that will be used to identify potential problems within the team of police officers.

The program collects such information as arrests, criminal investigations involving an officer, warrantless searches, injuries to subjects in custody, traffic crashes involving an officer, civil or administrative complaints. This is intended to help bring attention to officers who may be at risk for more severe conduct in the future.

According to Police Chief Robert M. Collins, Jr., "...the focus is on making sure that the Department can hold all officers accountable - ensuring that the citizens of Harvey can become more comfortable interacting with the police force and sends a message that the city will not tolerate improper behavior."

# RAFFIC CALMING A Project to Traffic Safety



The City of Harvey has started a project to address speeding and improve public safety. The *Traffic Calming Project* provides speed bumps throughout the city. Streets were selected based on crash data from the Illinois Department of Transportation (IDOT). The City of Harvey also looked at interest points, including schools, medical facilities such as the UChicago Medicine Ingalls Memorial, and senior housing.

#### Several locations now (or soon will) have a speed bump:

- West 151st Street and Seeley Avenue
- West 151st Street and Vine Avenue
- East 150th Street and Broadway Avenue
- West 157th Street and Marshfield Avenue
- East 160th Street and Lathrop Avenue

Additional speed bumps will be added in 2021. Ultimately, the *Traffic Calming Project* will improve public safety, slow traffic speeds, and reduce vehicle crashes.

**Police Dispatch Relocates** 

The City of Harvey has centralize dispatch services with Cook County Sheriff's Police 911 Center. This moves means that residents can expect a more reliable response with calling for police assistance. The contract with Cook County also means an annual savings of \$500,000 for the City of Harvey. This is a tremendous savings when considering the cost of keeping the old City of Harvey Police Department 911 Dispatch Center in-house and operational.


### **Harvey Police Apprehends Murder Suspect**

### Two Murder Counts Filed

On September 2, 2020, the City of Harvey Police Department received approval from Assistant State's Attorney for Cook County, Ed Murillo, to officially charge suspect Antonio D. Moore with two murder counts.

Moore, a 23-years-old Black male of 4927 S. St. Lawrence, Chicago, IL, allegedly fatally shot Shavontae Towers on August 26, 2020. A robbery led to the incident in which Towers, a 23-years-old Black male of 15211 Ashland Avenue, Harvey, IL, was shot and killed at his residence. The victim was known to the suspect, as both Moore and Towers were allegedly involved in illegal activities leading to the fatal incident.

"The investigative team of the City of Harvey Police Department worked diligently to close this murder investigation, resulting in a successful arrest and charges filed," said Robert Collins, Jr., Chief of Police. "Our priority continues to be the public safety of the community we serve. We take this priority very seriously and, therefore, will continue to make progress through arrests, thorough investigations, and lawful charges."

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# REAL LIFE STORM Caused Community-wide Destruction

City of Harvey residents are still asking what hit the town last August that destroyed the entire power grid. It was a strong, fast moving wind storm. It moved rapidly through the south suburbs, carrying winds of destruction like a tornado.

On August 10, 2020, the storm landed on the City of Harvey. Powerful winds snapped power lines like twigs and uprooted massive trees. By the time winds died down and the storm passed, 95 percent of the city was without electrical service for nearly a full week. During this time, community officials, including Mayor Christopher J. Clark, and area organizations worked together to help seniors and families. The Greater Food Depository and Cook County came to Harvey to provide meals, water, and juice for residents. All five senior housing buildings received lunches, dinners, and flashlights.


Com Ed and 1,500 technicians from across the country worked on rebuilding the city's power grid. Harvey officials worked with the Multi-Agency Resource Center (MARC) to provide disaster relief services for residents affected by the storm. Public Works and volunteers were at the forefront of major clean up efforts. There was an amazing display of cooperation, care, and unity during a time of community crisis.

Mayor Clark, members of the city council, and the administration is grateful to supporters who pitched in to help the city recover from the storm. The clean up effort took many days and many hands to pick up branches and trash from the streets and sidewalks. Supporters checked in on the community's most vulnerable residents to ensure they had supplies and resources to weather the aftermath of the wind storm.

For many in the City of Harvey, they had never experienced a tornado like storm. This was a scary moment in time for the community. Through it all, the City of Harvey worked together to recover and ready to continue its quest to build a better community.



# CITYWIDE UPGRADE Pilot Program to Improve Lighting Infrastructure



Ultimately, the City of Harvey expects a savings of approximately \$175,000 annually in utility bills. In addition to Elevate Energy and Cook County, the City worked with Production Distribution and Live Wire to complete the upgrade.


# PUBLIC WORKS Hiring in the Community
