Greetings Harvey,

As your mayor, I believe that transparency in government is the foundation upon which trust, accountability, and community engagement are built. It is my conviction that an open government not only enhances the efficiency and effectiveness of our city operations but also empowers our residents to be active participants in the democratic process.

One of the primary ways we ensure transparency is through our publicly held city council meetings. These meetings provide a forum where all city business is discussed openly. Open dialogue is crucial for maintaining accountability and ensuring that our residents are fully informed about the decisions that affect their community.

Our city website is designed to be transparent. It is a one-stop resource for all city-related information. The website features resources spanning detailed updates on current and upcoming projects aimed at boosting our local economy, listings of available positions within the city government and local businesses, council meeting minutes and municipal code, access to all council meeting documentation, along with the complete municipal code. In addition, our website offers information important to businesses such as guidance on how to conduct business with the city, necessary permits and regulations, upcoming events and meetings, and a calendar of all city events, council meetings, and other important dates.

Simultaneously, every Friday from 12 p.m. to 3 p.m., I hold open office hours where residents are invited to speak with me about community issues, ask questions, and share their concerns. These sessions provide a valuable opportunity for face-to-face communication, fostering a direct line of engagement between the community and myself.

Monthly block captain meetings and ward meetings support community engagement efforts. These gatherings allow residents to meet with community leaders, discuss neighborhood-specific issues, and stay informed about local developments. These meetings are pivotal in reinforcing connection to the everyday experiences and concerns of our residents.

In addition, water department inserts and newsletters are mailed monthly to residents. The water department inserts explain every ordinance and resolution from the previous city council meeting. They detail if an ordinance or resolution passed or failed. This publication includes updates from all government departments, a personal message from me, information on upcoming events, and opportunities for community volunteers. The newsletter is an essential tool for ensuring that every resident is kept up to date on important news and initiatives.

Transparency is not just a buzzword; it's a fundamental principle that guides my administration. Our efforts are designed to build trust, foster accountability, and create a more inclusive and responsive government. Thank you for your continued engagement and commitment to our community.

## ***Community Spirit Shines Through at Clean-Up Day***

On Saturday, June 8, 2024, the city of Harvey partnered with Neighborhood Works and State Farm to host a successful community clean-up day. From 9 a.m. until 2 p.m., volunteers from all over the city gathered to clean and beautify the vacant lot at 15400 Robey Avenue.

The cleanup day brought together a diverse group of volunteers, including elected officials Mayor Clark, Congresswoman Robin Kelly, State Representative Will Davis, Cook County Commissioner Monica Gordon,

residents, community leaders, and representatives from Neighborhood Works and State Farm. Their collective effort transformed the neglected lot into a more welcoming and visually appealing space, demonstrating the power of community collaboration and civic pride.

## ***Naloxone Vending Machines Available at Harvey Pace Bus Terminal***

Naloxone vending machines are available at the Harvey Pace Bus terminal with the purpose of combatting the opioid crisis. Elected officials and community leaders gathered on Friday, May 31, 2024, at the Harvey Pace bus terminal to announce the installation of Naloxone vending machines. This initiative aims to provide easy access to Naloxone, a life-saving medication used for the emergency treatment of known or suspected opioid overdoses.

The announcement was made by a distinguished group of elected officials, including State Representative Will Davis, Cook County Commissioner Monica Gordon, and several members of the Pace Board: Terry Wells, Rick Kwasneski, and Melinda Metzger. Also present was Ron Vlasaty from Family Guidance Center, Inc., an organization dedicated to substance abuse treatment and prevention.

Naloxone vending machines at the Harvey Pace Bus terminal are expected to significantly benefit the city of Harvey by reducing the number of fatal opioid overdoses. With opioid addiction continuing to pose a serious public health challenge, the availability of Naloxone is a critical component of the city's comprehensive strategy to address this crisis.

This initiative not only provides immediate access to a life-saving drug but also raises awareness about the ongoing efforts to support those affected by opioid addiction.

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## ***154th St. Road Construction***

This summer, the city is kicking off the 154th Street Improvement Project with \$4.2 million in funding from Cook County, Regional Transportation Authority, The Nature Conservancy, Department of Commerce and Economic Opportunity, and the Environmental Protection Agency through earmark funding from Senator Tammy Duckworth.

154th Street will be closed to all traffic (vehicles, bus, bicycles, and pedestrians) between Wood Street and Broadway Avenue from July 15th through late November. This is due to the reconstruction of the roadway along with installation of a new storm water system. Curb extensions will also be added.

The full closure of 154th Street will allow the project to be completed in a third of the time expected if only one lane

of travel was closed. We understand the full closure is an inconvenience, and we appreciate your patience as the area infrastructure is improved.



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## ***The TASC Program***

The Harvey Police Department has implemented several innovative programs aimed at making Harvey a safer and more supportive community for its residents. These initiatives, focusing on diversion and deflection tactics, aim to address issues before they escalate, offering residents assistance and resources that can make a significant difference in their lives.

The diversion program, facilitated by Treatment Alternatives for Safe Communities (TASC), plays a crucial role in assisting Harvey residents both before and after potential encounters with the police. The program's approach emphasizes treatment and support over punishment, postponing judgment throughout the completion of the individual's required treatment.

Residents can engage with the program through various avenues. Through self-referral, individuals can seek help on their own initiative. Police officers may also complete officer referrals when they encounter individuals who might benefit from the program. Residents may participate in active outreach where TASC specialists proactively engage with individuals who may need assistance from the program. Lastly, community outreach efforts are used in the broader community and provide information about available resources to residents.

The deflection outreach program is another critical initiative aimed at preventing overdoses and providing non-judgmental alternatives for treatment. Every Monday from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. and Friday from 3 p.m. to 5 p.m., TASC deflection specialists, alongside Detective Baptist, travel

throughout Harvey conducting outreach activities.

During these outreach sessions, harm reduction bags are distributed. These bags contain NARCAN, an emergency treatment for opioid overdoses, and information on how to contact specialists for further assistance. This program is particularly focused on individuals at risk of overdosing on controlled substances and those with co-occurring mental health and addiction issues.

The deflection outreach program also includes a self-referral component. Residents can visit the police station, request to speak with Detective Baptist, or leave a message for a referral. The TASC deflection specialists follow up with these individuals throughout the week to ensure their needs are met and provide ongoing support.

Since its inception in 2019 and becoming fully operational in 2021, this program has made significant strides in the community. It has also facilitated NARCAN training for the Harvey Police Department and members of Roseland Ceasefire, equipping them with the skills to respond to overdose situations effectively.

Through these diversion and deflection initiatives, the Harvey Police Department demonstrates a strong commitment to the well-being of its residents. By focusing on support and treatment rather than punishment, these programs provide individuals with the opportunity to overcome their challenges and contribute positively to the community.
